Introduction. CRA-W, an international computing body, has been organising the Grad Cohort workshop since 2004 in the US for women graduate students in computing. Over the last 15 years, the workshop has helped many women students through their graduate years and beyond.

Starting this year, ACM-W India decided to adapt the model of this workshop to the Indian setting. ACM India Grad Cohort 2018, the first pan-India workshop for women graduate students in computing was organised this year. The event took place on July 6, 2018 and July 7, 2018 in CSE department at IIT Bombay campus. This workshop was also made a part of the Diamond Jubilee Celebration of IIT Bombay.

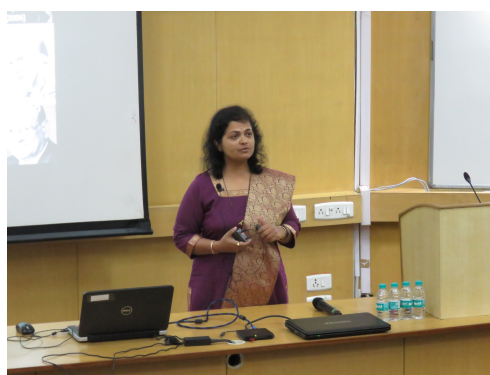
Participants. The main goal of this workshop was to reach out to Indian women graduate students in the field of computing. The event was attended by 75 participants who came from approximately 20 different colleges and universities across India. Among these around 45 students were pursuing their PhD in areas of computing, while the rest were students pursuing their Masters degree.
